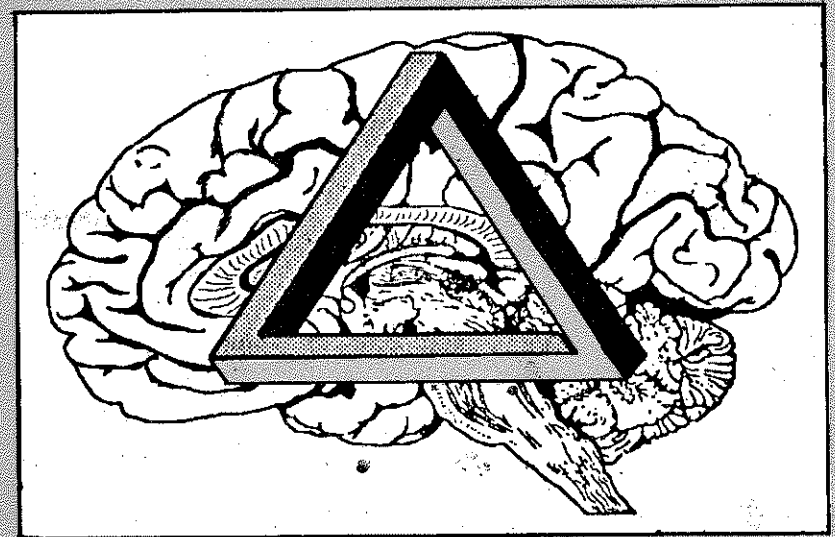


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Christopher Vedeler

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John H. Haddox has been teaching Philosophy at the University of Texas at El Paso for thirty years (nine years serving as department chairman). Among his publications are *Vasconcelos of Mexico: Philosopher and Prophet* and *Antonio Caso: Philosopher of Mexico* (both by University of Texas Press, Austin), two monographs, and numerous articles in academic journals. He was chosen to be a member of the *Seminario de la Cultura Mexicana*, as the fellow of Samuel Ziegler Foundation for Human Rights, and is the only U.T. El Paso faculty member to receive both the Faculty Research Award and the Award for Distinguished Achievement in Teaching.
